## **Reading at School**

### **Early Years**





To meet the expected standard by the end of Early Years, your child will working towards attaining the Early Learning Goal in reading. This is taken from the statutory assessment completed at the end of Early Years called the Early Years Foundation Stage Profile.

### The Early Learning Goal:

Children read and understand simple sentences. They use phonic knowledge to decode regular words and read them aloud accurately.

They also read some common irregular words.

They demonstrate understanding when talking with others about what they have read.

### How we support reading in school:

- Reading is embedded as a skill that is learnt across all areas of the Early Years curriculum.
- For phonics we use the Bug Club, Jelly and Bean, Big Cat Phonics and other similar books.
- We teach phonics each day and practise using their phonics to support the children's reading by sounding out words and blending.
- We also use clues from pictures.
- Teaching words on their word lists and tricky words that have also been sent home to help children with their reading.
- Read 1:1 with a child each week.

### Make reading fun by:

- Reading at home needs to be fun, something you both enjoy, a time for talk and laughter.
- Find a comfortable quiet place to read together.
- If your child starts to feel restless take a break and you could take over reading some of the story aloud yourself to keep it fun. 5 minutes a day is a great amount of time to read.

#### Talk about reading:

- There are prompt questions at the beginning of your child's Homework Diary to help you.
- Encourage your child to share different types of stories and texts such as; websites, recipes, road signs, newspapers, magazines.
- If your child gets stuck when coming across a word they don't know, you can encourage them to sound out or use their phonics. If they are still unsure, you can read it for them and praise their efforts.

### Home school reading diary:

Please record in the coloured diary each time you read at home with your child. You can comment on how clearly
then have read, any comments they have made or if they enjoyed the book and why. Your child's class teacher will
also write in when they read with them at school.
