With the easing of Covid restrictions we are looking forward to being able to more actively support charities and become part of our local community again. For many years, we have supported the MacMillan Cancer Coffee morning

and we were excited that the School Council could again organise an event and invite parents and carers in for a cup of coffee and cake after morning drop off. We were inundated with delicious homemade cakes and lots of parents joined us; each child in the school also had the chance to buy a cake to enjoy at snack time. Music in School

Before Covid, our music at Wivelsfield School was the envy of lots of local primary schools and we are excited to be rebuilding this reputation. As well as our curriculum lessons taught by music specialists, Mrs James has in excess of 30 Key Stage 2 children in the choir, whilst Mr Hards is leading a group of children playing guitars, bass guitar, clarinet, violins and ukulele in our re-formed school orchestra. Mr Hards and Mrs James continue to provide I: I music tuition in school for guitar, piano, keyboard and violin. Throughout last year, many children continued instrumental lessons online, when face to face tuition was impossible. Mrs lames reports that some of our last year's Owls excelled in exams, with one pupil achieving grade I ABRS in violin and a further two achieving distinction for the Trinity initial keyboard exam. Congratulations to the young musicians.

Pre School Provision

We are actively exploring if we can provide nursery care and education on site at Wivelsfield School. In November, look out for a formal consultation document about lowering the age range of the school and, a bit later in the month, a market research questionnaire about provision here. Covid Control Measures

To help control the spread of any Covid cases in school, we are keeping the classrooms and any communal areas well ventilated. Children can always wear a coat in class should they want to, but we aim to keep it warm enough so that is not necessary.

- To further develop the vocabulary in all areas of the curriculum across the school.

Behaviour and Attitudes

- For all pupils to demonstrate respect for the entire school community with developing self-control.
- To improve the attendance of vulnerable pupils so it is more closely aligned to that of non-vulnerable pupils

Personal Development

- To enable all children to further develop respect for our diverse society within and beyond school and begin to understand unconscious bias.
- To revisit developing a positive and growth mindset within the whole school community.
- To re-establish the school's presence within the local and wider community

Leadership and management

- To ensure the new school business manager leads an efficient and happy administration team and works effectively as a senior leader having a positive impact on all stakeholders .
- To work effectively with the local authority with a view to developing pre-school provision at Wivelsfield School.
- To continue to look after the well-being of all staff, further reducing work load where possible.
